





Plaster molds work really well with clay because it is such a porous material and can absorb the water from the clay quite quickly. As a result, it is important to keep monitoring your clay

Potter's Tip of the Month



Plaster Molds

Plaster is also a very delicate material. Any mark made by a tool for cutting, trimming or shaping an edge to your clay will make a mark or impression for the next potter to use. So, do not use any tools directly on the plaster.

after you lay it on the mold. Never store your piece on the

Simply press your clay on or around a plaster mold, wait a little while, perhaps an hour or so, depending on humidity and the moisture of the clay you are using. You will then

be able to take your clay off of the mold and continue to work on it while it holds the shape of the original mold.
